If you would like to donate the wine used at Mass for a particular month, the cost is \$65.00. If there are any questions, please call the Rectory at 708-333-3550.



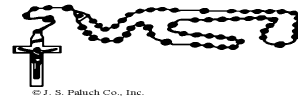

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As a result of the continued strain on the economy, families in the United States and throughout our world have experienced conditions in the past year that have not been seen for several generations. Additionally, natural disasters in a number of regions have caused thousands to seek emergency assistance from Catholic agencies for food, water and shelter.

Funds raised by last year's Peter's Pence collection enabled Pope Benedict XVI to provide assistance to the Nazareth Boys Town in Rwanda, which cares for abandoned orphans whose parents were victims of genocide and civil war. Likewise, the Holy Father aided in the establishment of the Hospital of St. Vincent de Paul, a health institution in Sarajevo, Bosnia, that provides critical care for an area of the world still recovering from internal conflict. These two examples are only snapshots of the corporal works of mercy supported by the Peter's Pence Collection.

In his recent encyclical, Pope Benedict reminded us that "God's love...gives us the courage to continue seeking and working for the benefit of all" (*Caritas in Veritate*, no. 78). Appropriately, this year's Peter's Pence Collection calls the faithful worldwide to **Cast the Love of Christ upon the World.**

Your generosity to this collection will ensure that the successor of Peter is able to respond to those most in need throughout our world. May Our Lord continue to bless you and your families as we share the love of Christ in the Archdiocese of Chicago and throughout the Universal Church. God is never outdone in generosity, and I pray He will reward you many times over for your charity. Please keep me in your own prayers.

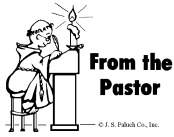

“Christ The Teacher”

Depicted in the center stained glass window in St. Jude’s Church is “Christ The Teacher.” The first prayer taught by the Lord to His Apostles was the OUR FATHER. He also taught in parables and stories which are depicted on the left side of the window where a HAND is portrayed sowing seeds. This recalls Jesus’ story of the “Sowing of the Seeds.” Immediately opposite we see a green bush in which we can find birds of the air finding a resting place to depict how our faith, through the Holy Spirit, grows from the smallest seed to a strong, stable, and firm faith.

The Triangle depicts the Old Testament portrayal of an all-seeing, all-knowing, all-loving God who works with us as unleavened manna (portrayed by the elliptical forms) which must be nurtured from the inside out until, as a member in the Mystical Body of Christ, we continue to affect the world and build the Kingdom of God.

Please take a moment in prayer, and give praise to Jesus Christ who always intercedes for us, who knows our deepest needs, and who longs for us to come closer to Him and grow in His love. “We can do all things through Jesus Christ who strengthens us.”

ON SCHLEPPING, CROSSES, AND FATHER'S DAY

It's been several years now since my wife Gail and I moved our daughter Sarah into Weston Hall at the University of Illinois as she began her collegiate career. I remember that it was hot that day. I remember that we parked as close as we could and that it was still a long way to and from the car. After the first few trips, Gail and Sarah thought it would be best if they began unpacking Sarah's stuff and bringing order to her new room while I continued to haul up boxes from the minivan. I was cool with the assignment, but it was a long day for me. And not only for me. Because as I was traveling from car to room and back to car again like a worker bee hauling nectar to the hive, I noticed another dad doing the same thing. We criss-crossed paths a few times before we exchanged words of camaraderie that still ring in my ear. "The only things fathers are good for," I said, "are for schlepping boxes and paying tuition." His smile and his sigh told me that he could relate.

The memory came to mind this past weekend at Jackson Square in New Orleans. I had gone to the Big Easy for the Catholic Press Association's annual Catholic Media Convention (primarily on the merit of this weekly column, I'm an associate member of the CPA). The convention ran through Friday night, then my wife and I did some Katrina-related volunteer work on Saturday morning in conjunction with the local Catholic Charities. Anyway, after we'd scrubbed down an old house and readied it for painting, we strolled the French Quarter and took a seat in the late afternoon on a bench in Jackson Square, not far from St. Louis Cathedral. That's when I saw the young father and his young wife strolling, too, across the slated pavement. The father pulled behind him a red wagon with three small children packed shoulder-to-shoulder-to-shoulder. They were wide-eyed. Lots of unusual things and unusual people in Jackson Square. The dad just looked tired. Probably a long day for him, as well.

I'm not whining, OK? But fatherhood is hard. As a friend told me years ago about parenthood in general, the years go by quickly, but you put in some long days. Exactly. And the days often involve a lot of schlepping, from toddlers in wagons through the French Quarter to boxes from car to dorm room or first apartment. Fathers are entrusted with carrying much more, of course. We are entrusted with carrying something of our children for as long as we live. We are entrusted with carrying their hopes and their disappointments, their victories and their defeats, their joys and their sorrows. "If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me," Jesus tells us in today's Gospel. More long days. Fatherhood is indeed a cross at times, and we don't always—at least I don't always—carry it well. I'm convinced, though, that there is goodness in the diligent attempt. That guy pulling the wagon has many years of schlepping ahead of him. God willing, so do I. It's heavy lifting at times, but *uplifting* just the same. Happy Father's Day.
